

From the Rabbi

In my recent letter to all our members, I issued a request for each of us to set aside more time for attending and supporting our Shule and its activities. Some have responded positively to this appeal, some have not. However, I am sure that all must agree in principle with my premise that something more is needed in life than just the pursuit of wealth and easy living, and that inspiration for a meaningful life can be gained from a greater awareness of our Jewish heritage.

Unfortunately, as with most good resolutions that we set for ourselves at one time or another, some strong catalyst is needed to assist in implementing a change in habit and lifestyle. Sometimes, while awaiting just such a catalyst, we find that time and opportunity have slipped away - we have waited too long and "have missed the boat".

The message of the Shavuot festival which we are about to celebrate can help us to understand and conquer this very human trait.

Judaism has many practical rituals, beautiful customs and traditions. Some have said that it is this very active personal participation by each individual that is responsible for the continued existance of our unique way of life. One would assume, therefore, that in celebrating the festival of Shavuoth, the anniversary of the dramatic giving and acceptance of our Torah and its teachings, we would have instituted the most beautiful Mitzvot and traditions to celebrate and remind us of this momentous event. The celebrations and rituals of Pesach, Succot Rosh Hashanah and even Yom Kippur should pale in comparison with those associated with the anniversary of our being given and accepting our eternal heritage and religion. But the festival of Shavuot has no special ritual of its own. Only a few customs of relatively minor significance have evolved over the years.

Yet it is this very fact that illustrates the importance of this anniversary. Though we celebrate the calender date of the anniversary of our receiving the Torah as a festival, the lifestyle that it teaches, which was to become the basis of civilised living for all of mankind, should be of such significance and importance to us that any ritual or ceremony would never be able to encompass or express such a notable and consequential event. The Torah, and the ethical and holy lifestyle that it teaches, cannot be confined to a particular ritual or festival - it is all-encompassing, for all time and in all circumstances.

The message is clear, and in extending the point further one can say that this is true of all important things in life. We don't have to wait for the right occasion, or some cataclysmic event, but that which is right and correct should be implimented immediately at any time, and under any circumstance.

In our own small way, each of us should relive the "Time of the Giving of the Torah" during the Shavuot festival and accept upon ourselves the everyday privileges and responsibilities of being a Jew in a more tangible way. Not just for a day or two a year, or while performing just one or two of the more well-known rituals, but in a manner that will be reflected always in one's life. Greater support and attendance

of our Shule, greater commitment to Jewish education for our family, a genuine attempt to bringing a few more Jewish values and traditions into our homes, are all ways of immediately channeling our Shavuot resolutions into tangible, instant reality.

In this way we can ensure the continued perpetuation of our heritage on this 3290th anniversary of our commitment to its teachings and ideals. and the time will surely come when each one of us will be able to celebrate this Harvest Festival as part of a committed and vibrant nation in our Holy Land of Israel.

It will be held on Sunday 18th June 1978, between 2 and 4 p.m. Our Rabbi will bless the home and affix the Mezuzot and, as we have not sent out any formal invitations, we hope that you will all accept this as a personal invitation to join us on this happy occasion.
